

Samuel Hull born 1820 Written by Cynthia Hull



Samuel married Agnes Smyth on 21st April 1845 at the Bovevagh Meeting House, near Dungiven. The witnesses to his marriage were Adam Magil and ? Hunter or Winter. That name I could not decipher. According to his daughter Emma the family moved from Limavady to Lisburn around 1860 where her father was Master of the first public school.

On our trip to Ireland we had found his death notice which stated Samuel Hull, late of 21 Seymour St.,



Samuel's home was here on 21 Seymore St. in Lisburn, Northern Ireland. Carol and Cynthia in the picture.

Lisburn, retired National, occupation - school teacher, died 10th April 1901, his effects were 52 pounds

Later in Lisburn Murray found his headstone, which included some of his children, all in all 9 or 10 people I think, plus two of the Irwins. This means he had kept in touch with his niece Susan's in laws.

Back in 1856 Susan Hull had married Hugh Irwin, Sam was one of their witnesses.

Soon after their marriage they had sailed to Australia, but that's another story.

I have since found out that Phillis Irwin who had been buried with Samuel was a granddaughter of hisshe had also married an Irwin ...and supposedly her nee name was Hull



I had intended to do just excerpts of Emma's letters but felt it would be easier to give you a list of all of Sam's kids.

John Willard Hull was born on 29th August 1845 Dungiven, Londonderry. he was baptised 27th September 1845, he died 24th April 1929, place unknown, however I checked the General Register of BMDs for England and found no trace, perhaps he returned to Ireland?
John's parents were given as a Samuel Hull and an Agnes Smith who married 21st August 1845 in Bovevagh, Londonderry.
Samuel Hull was baptised on 12 January 1820 in Dungiven or Mulkerra Londonderry and died 1st April 1901 in Belfast.
his parents were given as a Thomas Hull and Elizabeth Miller.

1. John Willard Hull – was a Mill manager , retired from his business as Mill Manager ..words from his sister Emma Hull. He went to South Americahis daughter Melissa Stoddard Hull went with him. I have not been able to find a wife for him but think the Stodart name could be her nee name

a) Melissa Stodart Hull ...please notice this is the correct spelling of her name Stodart born 1881 , I guess when I say Irelandshe was a very gifted lady , very well educated and became a Professor of Linguistics at the University of Rio de Janiero ..Brazil

On 22nd July 1941 she was appointed with an O.B.E. (Order of the British Empire) by Her Majesty's Representative at Riothis is a very high honor indeed...the full citations were and still are relicted and would have been destroyed following the investiture. In other words no reason will ever be known as to what part she played in for this honor. It leads me to suspect that she performed a service to which she could apply her skills. Crikey! Where did that come from ?

English Literature (1937)

Two exceptions in relation to the majority of the compendiums published during the Reforma Francisco Campos [Francis Fields Reformation] are *English Literature* by Melissa Stodart Hull and Machado da Silva, and *An Outline of English Literature* (1938), by Neif Antonio Alem, a time that deals with specific books on the history of English literature, both written in the English language.

In her old age she moved to a Nursing Home , Millbrook House, Child, Okford, Sturminster, Blandford ...Dorsetwould you believe. It no longer is a nursing home as far as I know ...and they do not keep records.

Melissa died on the 5th November 1970...in that nursing home ...she requests her body to be cremated and for her ashes to be sent to Ireland.

To be interred in the family grave in Greystones, Wicklowcemetery.

Melissa also mentions in her Will a sister ...Miss Agnes Muriel Hull of No 18 Metropie Court, Minehead, Somerset ..

***** I had a researcher look for Agnes Muriel, she said she found the death registration for Melissa ...and that she was born 21st November 1881 ...registered in Sturminster, Newton , Dorset ...so they were not necessarily in Ireland. Crikey!

And their appear to be other kids to this too ...a Minnie K. and Samuel M.

From Emma's letters she only mentions a son of John Willard ...Frederick George ...who lived with her in the old Hull house.

The Researcher also found stuff on John Willard Hull ...born 29th Aug 1845 Dungiven, she also found when he died 24th April 1929 but not where John also had a grand daughter who was a dentist and married a chap ? London, who was also a dentist.

In 1903-4 the club made its first appearance in competitive hockey in the Minor League. The successful team was: W. J. Wilson; H. B. Hanna; B. Boyd; A. McCluggage; A. T. Annesley; J. H. Wilson; A. E. Boyd, (Capt.); F. G. Hull; R. C. Bannister; J. H. Simpson and N. B. Kilpatrick.

Then came another milestone in Club history, after being selected as substitute Fred Hull was capped against Wales, his first cap, and the first won by a 'Garvey player.

It would be impossible to single out all of these and perhaps I may be forgiven for selecting my own list of "greats". The present generation cannot, of course, know a great deal about the very early players but one of these does have a unique place in Club history in the person of Fred Hull, the first 'Garvey man to play for his country.

First World War Period 1914-19

For such a comparatively small Club it is remarkable how many members joined up. Of these four were killed in active service, Corporal Quentin Dunlop, Lieutenant Edward Brown, R.I.R; Lieutenant Douglas Morrow, R. Garrison, Artillery; and Captain D. Mitchell, R.I. Fusiliers. Four others were discharged unfit for further service, F. T. W. Rice, W. G. Allen, H. Campbell and Stanley Boyd. Also serving were: J. B. Alexander, Dick Allen, G. W. Bannister, Ernest Boyd, C. Carson, Ernest Duff, D. J. Fullerton, Frank Garrett, Charles Garrett, Sydney Goldsmith, Oliver Goldsmith, E. S. B. Hamilton, Joe Harrison, G. Harvey, Jack Hobson, F. G. Hull, W. W. Hull, P. R. 10. George Hull was born to Samuel and Agnes Hull nee Smyth 13 Sept 1858 near Dungiven, Northern Ireland...he was their 9th child

Approximately 2002 I found George Hull , father Samuel Hull, mum, Agnes Smyth died and buried in Melbourne. I could not believe it.

While in Melbourne we visited the Melbourne Library for some research and the Public Records office for his will ...here we found

Probate Jurisdiction

In the Estate of George Hull, late of 490 Station Street, North Carlton in the Colony of Victoria, Clerk, deceased, intestate. At the time of his death his property consisted of Fifty two pounds twelve shillings and sixpence. or thereabouts. Also Watch, Jewellery, Personal effects etc. value 25 pound - Money in the Victorian Permanent Building Society,

Savings Branch 17 pound 11shillings and tuppence. Money in the Melbourne Savings Bank came to 10pound 1 shilling and fourpence. The next of kin named was his father Mr. Samuel M. Hull residing in Seymour Street , Lisburn, Ireland.

I also asked for any hospital admittance records...these we have in South Australia for the Royal Adelaide Hospital and a few country hospitals..but sad to say they were not saved in Victoria.

In 2008 I have since revisited the Public Records office to find nothing about George and his employment with the Tramways.

We also visited George's grave in the Melbourne General Cemetery

On the death certificate for George it states he died on the 21st January 1890, aged 28yrs of age ..the cause was Fibrous Enterica / Exhaustion ...his father Samuel Hull – Teacher , Mother Agnes Hull formerly Smyth . One column asks Where Born and How long in Colonyborn Lisburn, Ireland ...18months so we are looking at June / July 1888.

10. Alfred - he had a son who was a doctor before he was 21yrs of ageEmma states he took up mental work and became head of a great colony at Colchester, England. He died at 48yrs of age of cerebral hemorrhage and his name was Dr. Eric Randall Hull.

On the Medical Register for 1925 it has Eric
